Step 1: Reduce



Only buy products you need. Buy long-lasting products with minimal or no packaging to minimize the trash you generate. Think twice before putting an item in the trash.

Reuse, find another use for it, donate,

sell, or repair. Buy second-hand items.

SAVE ENERGY

- Switch your bulbs to LED, which use 75% less energy.
- Turn off lights, fans & appliances when you leave a room.
- Set your air conditioning to 78F / 26C or higher.
- · Consider getting a solar hot water heater.
- Look for appliances with the Energy Star certification.
- Use Rechargeable Batteries.

LAUNDRY

- Wash on shorter cycles, with cool or warm water & use ecosafe detergents
- Replace dryer sheets with reusable dryer balls
- Dry clothes on a line or drying rack enjoy the fresh scents of wind and sun.

GO PAPERLESS!

- Sign up for paperless billing for your monthly bills.
- Use the inkless side of mail, envelopes or documents for scrap paper for notes.
- Read books, magazines and newspapers digitally.

TRANSPORTATION

- Walk (exercise!), or use public transportation, bike, or carpool / rideshare.
- Consider buying an electric bike or car.

CITIZEN ACTION

- Pick up trash around your home & business. Keep your places litter-free.
- Organize a recycling program in your neighborhood, in your building or at your work or school. LimPiaR can help! Email us at <u>info@limpiar.org</u>

CONSCIOUS SHOPPING

- Bring reusable bags with you when you shop. Keep them in your trunk so they are always on hand. Or get a compact bag that you can have on your keychain. If you forget to bring your reusable bags, you can bring the items you buy in the cart back to your car.
- Shop Bulk (unperishable food items)
- Shop Green (eco-friendly)
- Shop Small (perishable food items) & packageless.
- **Shop Locally** | Support Local Businesses & Entrepreneurs. Buying imported products contributes to global warming and affects food security.
- Only buy what you need and avoid plastic wraps whenever possible.
- Washing fruits and veggies before consuming or cooking is healthier and environmentally-friendlier than buying plasticwrapped produce.


You can also buy local produce at marketplaces, but keep in mind that marketplaces keep a commission for each item sold and not all the money goes to the local farmer.

CONSCIOUS GARDENING

- START a HUERTO Grow your own herbs, fruits & vegetables.
 You can even do this on a terrace or balcony in pots. For workshops, click <u>HERE</u>.
- START A COMMUNITY GARDEN Find a plot, organize a group and start a community garden. For more on HOW click <u>HERE</u>.
- Instead of chemical fertilizers, USE COMPOST. See MAKE COMPOST (below)
- Instead of chemical weed killer, use 1 cup of salt, 1 teaspoon of dishwashing liquid and 1 gallon of vinegar. Spray on weeds.
- Plant native species in your tropical garden, ALWAYS avoid invasive species.
- Consider installing a rain barrel to capture rainwater. Use this water to water plants instead of city water.
- Instead of chemical pesticides, use a mixture of dishsoap and water or rubbing alcohol and water in a spray bottle or Neem Oil Spray.

- Say NO to single-use plastics like utensils, straws, cups, plates or to-go containers made of plastic or styrofoam at restaurants and TELL THEM WHY: "These single-use plastics are NOT recyclable and take hundreds of years to decompose! Please stop using them and take care of the environment."
- · Always keep a kit of reusable utensils & cup in your bag.
- Put a note on all your food delivery orders: "NO PLASTIC STRAWS OR UTENSILS PLEASE!"
- Say NO to plastic shopping bags bring your own. Keep them in your trunk so they are always on hand.
- Patronize restaurants that buy from local farms and suppliers, use reusable or compostable materials, recycle, compost, and keep the area around them clean.

LOOK for campaign signage for <u>DEJA UNA HUELLA LIMPIA EN PIÑONES</u> at participating restaurants -- we help businesses become more eco-conscious.

HOME & PERSONAL CARE

- Don't buy more plastic water bottles, which cost money and can last in the environment <u>for hundreds of years</u>. Some plastic releases phthalates and PFAS with negative effects to human health.
- · Glass jars and bottles make excellent storage containers.
- Re-use wrapping paper or gift bags. Or wrap a gift in a fabric or a dishtowel as part of the gift.
- Use washable cloth napkins, sponges, and dish cloths.
- Purchase refillable items.
- Use reusable cloth menstrual pads, liners, and panties and/or reusable menstrual discs and cups. They can last up to 10 years. Disposable pads & tampons take <u>500-800 years to</u> <u>decompose</u>.
- Use reusable cloth diapers for your baby, toddler, child or adult with special needs. These too can last decades if used and washed correctly.

Almost ANYTHING can be repaired. Just type REPAIR and the name of the item into your browser and VOILA! Here are a few tips:

- Check the air in your tires once a month. Incorrect tire pressure contributes to pollution and increased fuel consumption.
- Care for our water system! Remember flushing medications and chemicals end up in our drinking water.

SLOW DRAIN?

Try ½ cup of baking soda, followed by 1 cup of white vinegar, followed by boiling water. Repeat if necessary.

Step 2: Recycle



For the BASICS of Recycling, you can visit the EPA"s <u>Recycling 101</u>.

Make sure that the items you put in the Recycling container are RECYCLABLE in Puerto Rico.

CLEAN it and DRY it BEFORE you BRING it.

RECYCLING IN PUERTO RICO

- PLEASE CONTACT organizations first to confirm what and when they accept the recyclables, if there is a fee, or if they pay for items.
- Items that are collected in Puerto Rico by most recycling organizations that do curbside or building pickups are:
 - plastics #1 (PET or PETE),
 - plastics #2 (HDPE)
 - aluminum cans
 - o non-laminated paper,
 - non-laminated corrugated cardboard,
- Look for the numbers #1 and #2 in the triangle at the bottom of plastic containers.
- Some recyclers like Reciclaje del Norte and IFCO also take plastics #5 (PP).



- CLEAN it and DRY it BEFORE you BRING it rinse & dry them
 or scrape to remove any organic residue. Labels, tapes,
 stickers, or other materials should be removed when possible.
- DO NOT add items that are dirty or wet to the recycling container. They might contaminate the other items that are recyclable and then it will all end up in the landfill.

Step 2: Make compost




Separate your ORGANIC WASTE

— egg shells, fruit and vegetable
peels, garden trimmings, and
coffee grounds — for COMPOST.

Composting improves the health of soil by improving nutrient content and moisture retention on the topsoil. Compost also reduces the need for artificial fertilizers and pesticides that may have negative effects on the environment and on human health.

How Composting Works:

Composting is the process in which we imitate nature in its nutrient recycling.

It consists of the decomposition of organic matter in a controlled way to return nutrients and matter to the soil and be able to grow food in an ecological way.

Step 3: Responsible Disposal



If you cannot reuse, sell, repair, repurpose or recycle something, then you should dispose of it responsibly. The most important thing is to NOT send items to a landfill that are considered hazardous waste.

According to the <u>EPA</u>, Puerto Rico residents on average dispose of 5.56 lbs of solid waste per person, each day. Recycling rates in Puerto Rico are low, with less than 10% of solid waste diverted.

The majority of landfills have unlined areas, or a combination of lined & unlined areas. Unlined, noncompliant landfill areas can release a substantial volume of contaminated leachate as runoffs into streams and rivers during heavy rains and into the groundwater of Puerto Rico, much of which are vital drinking water resources.

Many products require special care and should NEVER be poured down the drain or thrown out with regular trash.
